Foglemans' - A little history for future generations...

Genealogy enthusiasts must have figured on using a little math in the history scenario since one must know the location of point "A" in order to reach point "B." With that in mind, this newsletter will continue at the end of the first *Fogleman Newsletter*.

A whole group of Isleys, Cobles, Shoffners, Foglemans, etc. came at the same time from Baden, Germany, according to the book *Thirty Thousand Names of Immigrants 1727-1776 in Pennsylvania*. Another source covering this group of families is the *History of Lutheran Church In North Carolina* edited by Jacob L. Morgan, and published by the United Angelica Lutherans in North Carolina. The Colonial Records on file in the State Archives, Raleigh, North Carolina include records on Foglemans and Loys, and including Stinking quarters living conditions at that time. Background publications for the State of North Carolina include the *Account Founding of New Bern* by Christopher Von Graffenried.

The 1960 *Naturalization Book For North Carolina* by Lorena Shell Eaker shows George Fogleman applied to the Superior Court, Rowan County, North Carolina, District of Salisbury in March 1763 for a Certificate of Naturalization and to receive their sacraments (meaning that he was a Catholic or a Lutheran). The record revealed no restrictions. The records should have been on file in the State Archives in Raleigh, however, the Middle District of North Carolina of the United States District Court indicate their records do not date back further than 1910. The Superior Court in Rowan County, Salisbury, North Carolina did not have the information. This would be the first document connecting George Fogleman to the State of North Carolina.

Fogleman Coat of Arms

After a family crest appeared on the first *Fogleman Newsletter*, the question arose for details about its authenticity, and whether or not it was the correct crest for our family. Also, if it was available commercially and where it could be ordered?

The Fogleman Coat of Arms illustrated left was drawn by an heraldic artist from information officially recorded in ancient heraldic archives. Documentation for the Fogleman Coat of Arms design can be found in Rietstap Armorial General. Heraldic artists of old developed their own unique language to describe an individual Coat of Arms. In their language, the Arms (shield) is as follows:

"Divided black over gold, one monster over the division, the top portion a heraldic gold eagle the bottom, a man of black."

***Will of George Fogleman,
dated 18 March, 1785 - filed in
Orange County, North Carolina:***

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA
COUNTY OF ORANGE

IN THE NAME OF GOD AMEN.
I, GEORGE FOGLEMAN of the
County of Orange in the State of North
Carolina, weaver, being very sick and
weak in body but of perfect mind and
memory, thanks be given to God,
calling unto mind the mortality of my
body and knowing that it is appointed
for all men once to die, do make and
ordain this my Last Will and
Testament, that is to say, principally
and first of all, I give and recommend
my soul into the hand of Almighty
God that give it, and my body I
recommend to the Earth to be buried in
a decent Christian form at the
discretion of my Executors, nothing
doubting but at the general reservation
I shall receive the same again by the
power of God, and as touching such
worldly estate wherewith it has
pleased God to bless me in this life. I
give and devise and dispose of the
same in the following manner and
form,

First of all I give and bequeath
unto *Catherine, my dearly beloved
wife* two horse creatures, the choice of
all except the stallion, also three cows,
the choice of all I have, two frying
pans, two iron pots, one bed and bed
cloths, and a Negro fellow called

Childs, the above named I give her to
enjoy as long as she liveth, and then
after her death to be equally divided
amongst all my children or their heirs,
also I give her the old plantation to live
thereon, and enjoy the whole benefits
thereon, and all the improvements,
wood, and every thing there unto
belonging, until my *son Henry* comes of
age. Secondly, I give and bequeath unto
my *son John*, a certain track or parcel of
land which I purchased of Abraham
Shelton lying and being in the County
of Orange, on both sides of Stinking
quarter, bounded as follows, beginning
at a white oak SE as the deed, the deed I
had from said Abraham Shelton
expresseth, also a parcel of land
adjoining said track of land, on the
North side end and on the West side of
my old plantation, the said land I will
unto him and his heirs forever, to enjoy
and possess, and use at his pleasure,
also a certain brown mare called Jenny,
providing always he paying, one
hundred pounds current money of this
state, to wit, yearly and every year five
pounds until he hath paid the above
mentioned one hundred pounds, unto
his brothers and sisters, excepting his
equal part with them, and unto my *son
Peter* I give and bequeath five pounds
current money to be raised and levied
out of my estate beside and above his
equal part with the rest of my children,
also a certain mare which he has now in
possession to keep forever, and unto my
son Henry, I give and bequeath a certain
track of land containing two hundred
and eight acres of land it being the old
Plantation whereon I now live with all
its improvements and privileges
thereunto belonging forever, providing
he paying to each and every of his
brothers, and sisters two pounds or their
heirs, to wit two pounds every year until
he hath paid them - and unto my
daughter Eve I give and bequeath a
spinning wheel, a bed and bed cloths an
iron pot, and as much pewter as I give
to *either of my daughters, when they left
me*, and as to my books to be divided
amongst all my children, and as to all
the rest of my estate to be sold and then
equally divided amongst all my children
after my loving wife Catherine taking
her thirds out of it, and her saddle not to
be sold but keep it, and my daughter
Eve is to have two cows, and

Calves, I also will that my son John to
have a black mare colt, afore the sale
said colt I give and bequeath unto
him, and my *son George Adam* to
have a sorrel stallion colt, said colt I
give and bequeath unto him, also I
will that my wife shall or may have
my wagon at the price of twenty two
pounds twelve shillings and said sum
then to be redirected out of her third,
and if she do not choose it then to be
sold and equally divided, I also
constitute, make, and ordain Malechi
Fogleman and Adam Starr, the sole
executors of this my Last Will and
Testament, and I do hereby utterly
disallow, revoke, and disannul all and
every other former testaments, wills,
legalees, bequest and executors by me
in any ways before named, willed and
bequeathed, ratifying and confirming
this, and no other to be my Last Will
and Testament, in witnesses
WHEREOF I have set my hand and
seal this eighteenth day of March in
the year of our Lord one thousand
seven hundred eighty and five.

Signed, sealed, published,
pronounced, and declared, by the
George Fogleman, as his Last Will
and Testament who in the presence,
and in the presence of each other have
hereunto subscribed our names.

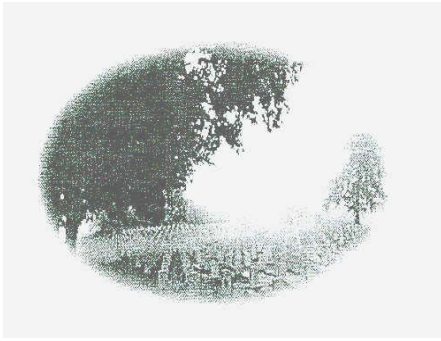

Above the shield and helmet is the Crest which is described as:

"One young man issuing clothed in black crowned gold, with wings instead of arms.

Family mottos are believed to have originated as battle cries in medieval times. A Motto was not recorded with the Fogleman Coat of Arms.

Whether or not Foglemans in Germany ever had a Coat of Arms has not been established by this writer. It is unlikely. However, you may obtain this crest from Halberts, 3687 Ira Road, Bath, Ohio 44210.
