FACTS ABOUT FOGLEMANS

A few of the early Orange County, North Carolina property records for George Fogleman were included in the last *Fogleman Newsletter*. The older documents are sometime difficult to understand. Therefore, legal terms as described in the *Law Dictionary For Non-Lawyers* by Daniel Oran may help in translating their meaning. All terms, with the exception of the two forms of "& et cet," have been taken from this *Dictionary*, as follows.

Alienate – Transfer, **convey**, or otherwise dispose of property to another person; the process is called "*alienation*" when land is transferred.

Assign – 1. To appoint or select for a particular purpose or duty. 2. To transfer or make over formally; for example: to deed over land to another person. 3. To point out, set forth, or specify; for example: to "*assign errors*" is to specify them in a legal document.

Appurtenance – Something that belongs to or is attached to something else; for example: both a right of way and a barn may be an appurtenance to land.

Heir – A person who inherits property.

Hereafter – An unnecessarily formal word meaning "in the future."

Hold – To possess or own something lawfully and by good **title**.

Indenture – Old word for a formal paper, such as a **deed**, with identical copies for each person signing it.

& et cet. – and so on and so forth.

& (ampersand) = and Et. Cet. – (Latin) for "so forth."

Release – 1. The giving up or relinquishing of a claim or a right by the person who has it to the person who owes the claim or against whom it might have been enforced; for example; most persons demand a *release* in exchange for paying money to settle an accident claim. 2. The piece of paper in no. 1.

Seal – An identification mark pressed in wax. Originally, for a document to be valid, it had to have a wax seal on it to show that it was done seriously, correctly and formally. Later, the use of the letters "*L.S.*" took the place of wax. Now, there is no need for the seal at all except for making sure that the right person actually signed (like in front of a **notary public**, who has a seal), or to formalize certain **corporate** documents with a corporate seal.

Subscribe – 1. Sign at the end of a document (as the person who wrote it, as a witness, etc.). 2. Agree to purchase some initial stock in a corporation.

Whereas – A vague word, often used to mean "because"...

Warranty – 1. A promise in a **deed** that the **title** to the land being sold is good and is complete. 2. A statement or promise, made as part of a transaction (such as an **insurance contract**), upon which the transaction depends. (The insurance company could refuse to pay a **claim** if the statement is false or if the promise is not kept.) 3. A statement or other **representation** (written description, etc.) made by a seller to a buyer as part of the sale as to the type, quality, ownership, use, etc. of the goods. 4. Any **obligation** imposed by law on a seller to a buyer; for example: that the product is fit for use. 5. Any promise that certain facts are true.

Witness – 1. A person who is present at an occurrence (such as an accident), an event, or the signing of a document. 2. A person who makes a statement under **oath** that can be used as evidence (in a court, **legislature, hearing**, etc).

Genealogy Researcher Betty Mayes of Hillsborough, North Carolina collected copies of all of the Fogleman property records between 1760 - 1849 that had been recorded in the Orange County Registrar of Deeds, North Carolina.

A Collection of Malachi Fogleman facts and notes

In June 2002, William L. Johnston of Raleigh, North Carolina inquired about whether or not information on Malachi Fogleman might be covered in the *Fogleman Newsletter*. Only bits and pieces on Malachi had been accumulated at the time but the wheels began rolling to pull all the data together. Once the material had been placed in chronological order, an attempt was made to contact Mr. Johnston and provide those facts and first person tales to him. E-mail messages had been returned to the sender. In early July 2003, a telephone call to Sarah Johnston revealed that Mr. Johnston had passed away in July 2002. In honor of William L. Johnston, the work on Malachi has been formulated for you. The name "Malachi" is spelled according to the source.

N. C. State Archives (Michael Shoffner, #628, was listed just below Malachi on this listing.)

1790NC **Malachai** – Orange Co. Tax list – 1790 - is 318 acres (this would seemingly include the 100 acres from Jacob Anthony where the deed was executed in 1791.)

21 June NC Inquisition for the State of N.C. and on oath of John Shaty, Henry Kimbrough, Wm. Ray, Jacob Albright, Rob. Homes, Peter Wolf, John Homes, James Holmes, Micholas Gibs, **Malachi Fogleman, Boston Graves, & Philip Snoterly say that Samuel Stroudmire ... personally seized a tract of land containing two hundred acres... Orange County, N.C. Coroners Reports, #C.R. 073-928.12 (this document has the signatures and a finger print of those that had taken the oath.)

Notes dated June 25, 2002 from William L. Johnston:

- “1. My original knowledge of the Fogleman family came from my aunt Florence (1896 – 1992), who said three brothers came over from Germany to Pennsylvania and then came down to NC. She only knew the name of George, but not the other two.
2. In 1984 I had a conversation with a Mrs. Clela Murray (age 90 then) who lived near Snow Camp, was quite spry, and seemed to be quite knowledgeable about the family.
3. She told me **Malachi** was one of the brothers and that he and his wife (possibly a Shoffner) were both buried in unmarked graves on the Gene Isley farm near Snow Camp.”

Notes from Katrine Crouse and J. M. Robbins:

1. **Malachi** Fogleman (b. before 1743, prob. younger brother to George b. 1721)
2. John Fogleman, born circa 1775-76, m. May 13, 1803 Maria Elisabetha Albrecht “Elizabeth” and “Betsy” [@Brick Ch. Marriage]. Both John and Elizabeth were living in 1850 Census.
2. George Fogleman b. 26 May 1774, d. 1847 [@ St. Pauls Luth tombstone] m. Rachel Shaddy.
 3. *Elizabeth “Betsy” (b. 3 June 1798 m. 20 Mch 1816 (1) John Vestal, m (2) John “Jack” Johnson
 3. Sarah “Sally” (b. 13 Apr 1801 m. 12 May 1818, Solomon Albright.”

From Frances R. Johnson forwarded by Edwin Coble:

Orange Co Estate Papers: Call No. 073.508.37 Item 2: “File of George Fogleman – This file consisted of a number of subpoenas to testify in a case of John Beaver’s plea of trespass and damages. There were three for David F., constable, son of George Fogleman, Decd., various dates in 1820. There was also a subpoena for **Malachi** F, and a note that John Coble and Caterina and Samuel F. have already exhibited their petition. (Francine Swaim in Raleigh. She found many other F. papers).” Referenced John Shaddy’s Will dated 24 February 1809.

Letter dated 29 April 1993 to Edwin Coble from Katrine Crouse:

“Caty Shaddy married George Adam Fogleman, b. 1759 or 1760 (probably a twin to John died 1805, he was the son of George Fogleman (I) and Catherine Curtis of Germany.
1 son known DAVID FOGLEMAN b. 1784 m- Maria Catherine Moser m. 26 Jan 1812.
Rachel Shaddy married George Fogleman b. 26 May 1774 – died 27 Sept. 1846 -- He was the son of **Malachi** Fogleman (George I & Malachi were probably brothers or cousins) 2 daughters (.)
Young – George had a brother John Fogleman b. 1775 or twin to George living 1850 Alamance County Census – married Elizabeth Albright of Jacob (she was living in 1850 Census. B-1782 --- they married 13 May 1803, at Brick Church by the Rev. Henry Diffenback. Lived at Malachi Fogleman home place and buried on the home place with his mother & father **Malachi** – with fieldstones (no dates).”

Loved ones that are gone but not forgotten:

MARK ALAN WAGONER

BURLINGTON – Mark Alan Wagoner, 31, died instantly on May 28, 2003 in Denali National Park, Alaska, as a result of a tragic plane crash. Mark was born in Alamance County on September 23, 1971. In the short span of his life, Mark's passion for adventure and indelible zest for life profoundly impacted those around him. He loved to share his excitement of the outdoors with others. Mark attended Alamance County Schools from kindergarten through the tenth grade. After leaving Southern Alamance High School in 1987, attended and graduated from the N.C. School of Math and Science in Durham in 1989. While in high school, Mark attended the N.C. Governor's School-East in mathematics and earned the rank of Eagle Scout. Mark scored 1580 on the SAT and was accepted at N.C. State University where he was a National Merit Scholar, a Caldwell Scholar, a member of the NCSU Fellows Program, and a Rhodes Scholar nominee. Mark graduated Summa Cum Laude with B.S. degrees in Electrical Engineering and Physics from N.C. State in 1994. Following graduation, he was employed by Procter & Gamble in Browns Summit, N.C. from 1994 to 2001. Mark returned to college in the fall of 2001 and recently graduated on May 10, 2003, with a Masters in Business Administration from Duke University.

Mark was an avid outdoorsman and enjoyed mountaineering. Some of his major accomplishments include National Outdoor Leadership School training in Alaska, certified Wilderness First Responder, and Instructor with Colorado Outward Bound. Mark led technical climbs on Mt. Rainier in Washington, Mt. Hood in Oregon, and Chimborazo in Ecuador. He remained an active participant with the NCSU Fellows Program and helped lead several annual mountaineering trips for students to Colorado, Wyoming, and California.



Mark was preceded in death by two grandfathers, Leroy E. "Pete" Wagoner and Clarence Fogleman. He is survived by his fiancée, Rebecca Roberge, of Cincinnati, Oh.; his parents, L. E. Jr. and Rachel Wagoner of Snow Camp, N.C.; his brother, Todd, and wife, Yumi Wagoner, of Pittsboro, N.C.; and two grandmothers, LaRue Wagoner of Snow Camp, N.C. and Helen Fogleman of Burlington, N.C. Mark is also survived by 6 aunts, 7 uncles, and 17 cousins.

The funeral service was conducted on Tuesday, June 3, 2003 at 3 p.m. at Mt. Pleasant United Methodist Church in Kimesville, by Dr. Charles Adam. Visitation was held on Monday from 6 to 8 p.m. at Rich and Thompson Mortuary in Burlington. Interment was held at the Mt. Pleasant United Methodist church cemetery following the service.

The family is deeply appreciative of all acts of kindness, food, cards, prayers, and support. As a tribute and as a celebration of his life, a memorial fund has been established in Mark's honor with the NCSU Caldwell Fellows Program. “Mrs. Clea Patterson Murray told me her Mother said --- **Malachi** Fogelman came to America single, lived in a three sided shack or house, kept a fire burning in front of the opening to keep wild animals away. He probably cooked his meals on this open fire and warmed in the Winter from the fire. After 10 years in America he went back to Germany for the Girl that he had left behind. When he came back to America according to tradition he brought his bride and also Michael Shoffner I and his wife Margaretha Vogleman and their 4 children (Margaretha was believed to be his sister or cousin. (The year he returned was believed to be 1760 or around then --- **Malachi** Fogelman and his Bride lived where later Eugene Isley lived just in front of where later Friendship Methodist Church was built and is buried on his Plantation back of his house a short distance with fieldstones. No dates.” (Similar info referenced in a January 7, 1980 note of Craig Emerson about a telephone conversation with Mrs. Murray who was 86 years old at the time (born - 1894).

Probably **Malachi** Fogleman and his wife of whom no one can name had more than George and John Fogleman, maybe some girls --- there is (are) no papers at Raleigh - nothing can be found.”

Died Aft 1820 **Malachi** Fogleman is buried on his homeplace (later the Gene Isley place near Friendship Church in Alamance County, N.C.
