## FACTS ABOUT FOGLEMANS

**- JOHN SHADDY FOGLEMAN**

Several Fogleman families moved away from the Piedmont area of North Carolina in the late 1700's. Those who left in the 1800's were affected by the state's depressed economy or had an aversion against slavery. Many settled in Kansas, Illinois, Indiana, South Carolina, Tennessee, or Virginia. One family may have left for another reason. A dispute regarding use of a gate on the property owned by John Shaddy Fogleman became difficult when adjoining landowner Michael Shoffner III wanted to make it available for public use. An Alamance County (NC) jury agreed with Mr. Shoffner. After John moved to Randolph County (NC), he began selling hundreds of acres of land owned around the area. There may have been other reasons for the move, ones that are shown in the family genealogy below.

1. JOHN SHADDY<sup>3</sup> FOGLEMAN (*JOHN, HANS GEORGE*<sup>1</sup>) was born 12 Feb 1805 in Orange County, North Carolina, and died 04 Sep 1878. He married TEMPE ROBERTSON 16 Oct 1827 in Orange County, North Carolina, daughter of NATHANIEL ROBERTSON and EVE SHOFFNER. She was born 25 Apr 1807 in Orange County, North Carolina, and died 18 Jun 1853. John Fogleman also resided in the counties of Guilford and Randolph before settling in Montgomery County, Illinois. Three years after the taking of the 1850 US Census, John would lose the love of his life. Tempe at the age of 46 would be buried at St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church Cemetery, Alamance County, North Carolina. The youngest child, Henry, would have been four years old.

On January 1, 1838, John S. Fogleman and Henry Fogleman bought a Grist Mill from Henry Euliss for the price of eleven hundred dollars. In the year of 1868, John S. Fogleman removed to Montgomery County, Illinois. John was a Captain (unknown branch of military/militia). John is buried at the Wares Grove Church, 69 Waresgrove Ln, Butler, Montgomery County, IL. He was 74 Yrs 7 Mo. 26 Days at the time of death.

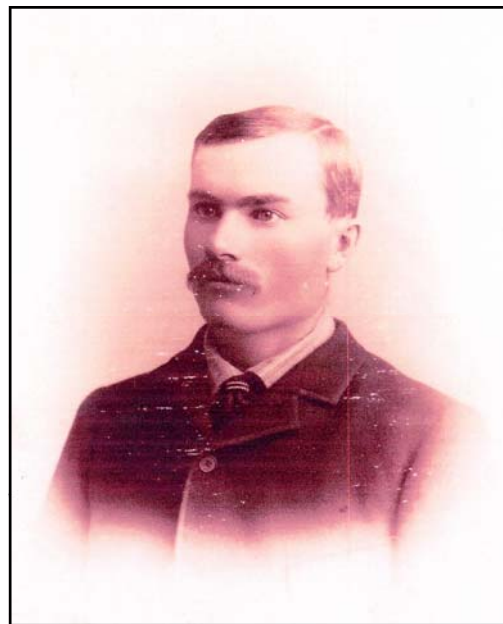

Josephine is buried at the Wares Grove Lutheran Church Cemetery, 69 Waresgrove Ln, Butler, Montgomery County, IL. She was age 57 Yrs 6 Mo. 26 Days at time of death.

2. DR. JEROME G.<sup>4</sup> FOGLEMAN (*JOHN SHADDY*<sup>3</sup>, *JOHN*<sup>2</sup>, *HANS GEORGE*<sup>1</sup>) was born 14 Oct 1833 in Warren County, South Carolina, and died 26 Aug 1875 in Montgomery County, Illinois. He married SECELIA A. GRANTHAM 04 Aug 1860. She was born 31 Aug 1843 in Marion County, South Carolina, and died 19 Apr 1923 in Phillipsburg, Phillips County, Kansas.

Jerome's grave stone: "Our Father Jerome G. Fogleman Oct. 14, 1833 Aug. 26, 1875 Age 41 Years. 10 Mo. 12 Days." There is also a monogram of Jerome's initials at the top, although the "F" is hard to see." Notes taken from letter dated June 25, 2004 from Ellen Fogleman Whitworth to Elvin Fogleman, a descendant of John S. Fogleman, father of Jerome.

Dr. Jerome Fogleman (ca. 1875-1875)

"Had wooden leg. Leg shot off in Civil War, lived in S. Carolina. Married there. One story says he died there. "Sealy" moved to Illinois; then to Kansas." per hand-drawn genealogy chart on family presented by Elvin Fogleman, a descendant of Dr. Jerome G. Fogleman, to writer (Judie Lewis). Reference is also made to Pee Dee, S. Carolina that is between Marion and Florence.

"Had slaves."

Dr. Fogleman is buried at the Iowa Union Cemetery/ Wares Grove Lutheran Church Cemetery, Illinois

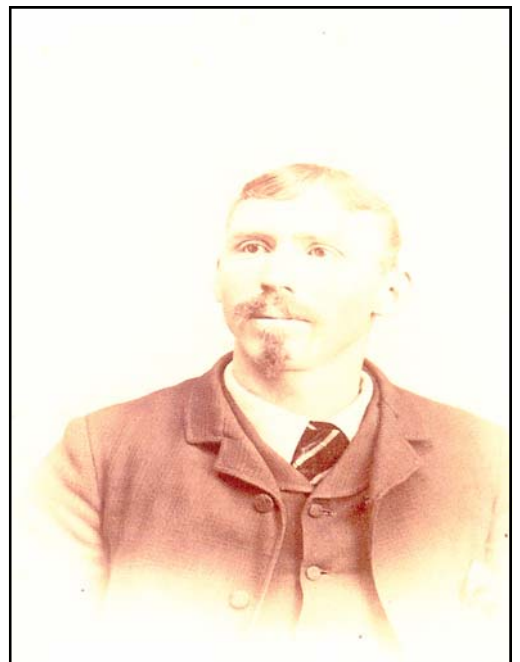
Secelia's obituary reads as follows: The Obituary - Fogleman dated 19 April 1923 (Thursday) for Celia appeared in the "Phillipsburg News." It read "Together with her husband and four small children she moved to Illinois, where they made their home for several years. Here the husband and two little daughters were laid to rest. Later Mrs. Fogleman with her four sons and one daughter moved to Kansas, homesteading land where she lived until the time of her death, April 9, 1923. During this period of years two of her sons, Jerrome and Oscar, passed away and were laid to rest in Iowa Union cemetery. Two sons, Robert and William Fogleman of Phillipsburg, and one daughter, Mrs. Ella Kinsey of Naponee, Nebr., twelve grand children and seven great-grand children remain to mourn her loss.

It further reads, "Mrs. Fogleman confessed her faith in Christ and united with the Methodist church when but a child and lived a consistent Christian life. Thru all her bereavement of loss of husband and children, struggles of early pioneer life in Kansas and the raising of her children, she was sustained by her faith in God. Even in her last days of suffering, her patience and thoughtfulness for others was a marked characteristic of her nature."

According to the "Phillips County" of Phillipsburg, Kansas, Thursday, May 25, 1916, "He moved with his parents to Illinois when three years old and came to Kansas at the age of 13 years where he grew to manhood. In the year 1893 he went to Cripple Creek, Colorado, where he has been in business until the time of his death, May 18, 1916. He was brought to Phillipsburg and laid to rest in Iowa Union cemetery May 20, 1916. His brother, Jerome Fogleman, died just 13 years ago at the same place in the same way and on the same day of the month. He was married to Lulu Opdike on June 19, 1898. The wife and her sister, Mrs. Wilson, and his business partner, Mr. Ellis Rosenberg, and R. D. Fogleman accompanied the body to Phillipsburg. Mrs. C. M. Fogleman, of Ottawa, Kansas, is here and all the relatives were present at the funeral. Ellis Rosenberg, who was his business partner, came all the way from Cripple Creek to be present at the last sad rites of his friend and business associate, and rendered every assistance possible to those who are left to mourn the departure of one of God's noblemen.

The following obituary notice relative to the death of Oscar Fogleman is taken from the *Cripple Creek Times*: "For the last four days Mr. Fogleman made a brave but losing fight against death. Attending physicians realized there was no hope for him yet they remained almost constantly at his bedside, leaving nothing undone that might save the life of a man so highly admired by his friends and loved by his wife and relatives.

Mrs. Fogleman, who for several months has been in California in the hope that her health would be benefitted by the change, was at his bedside when the end came, as were other relatives of the deceased.

For more than a score of years, Mr. Fogleman has been prominently identified with the life of the Cripple Creek district. He was regarded as one of the most efficient, practical mining men of the district and during his association here with large mining interests, he established a reputation as a capable manager of mining properties - a man thoroughly trustworthy and reliable in all his dealings.

Born on a plantation in Marion county, N.C. (should be S.C.), November 16, 1865, Mr. Fogleman when a baby not yet in trousers, moved with his parents to Illinois and later to Phillipsburg, Kan., where his aged mother and other relatives now reside. When 21 years of age he came west in quest of a fortune, in the mining camps of Colorado. He came to the Cripple Creek district 22 years ago and engaged in mining. His employers were quick to recognize his ability and a short time after his arrival here, he was made manager of the Forest Queen mine, Ironclad hill, and has been in charge of properties in that section of the district ever since. He formerly was in charge of operations at the Old Gold mine, the Jerry Johnson, and for a number of years was superintendent of the W. P. H. mine, in addition to his interests in leases which he had from time to time. Mr. Fogleman was a consistent booster for the Cripple Creek district. In his unassuming way he always had something good to say about the district and he was a firm believer in the great possibilities the district afforded.

While Mr. Fogleman never sought a political office in Teller county, and never took an active part in political demonstrations of any kind, his standing in the community made him popular in local politics. His name was placed on the primary ballot for sheriff a few years ago and he lost the nomination by a small plurality. He did not ask for the nomination.

He was past exalted ruler of B. P. O. Elks number 316 of this city, was a delegate to the grand lodge in San Francisco a few years ago, and has occupied all the chairs of honor in the lodge. He was a member of the local lodge of Knights of Pythias.

Besides his widow, Mr. Fogleman is survived by his mother, Mrs. Celia Fogleman, 82, two brothers, R. D. and W. P. Fogleman, all of Phillipsburg, Kansas, a sister, Mrs. W. T. Kinzie, Naponee, Nebraska.

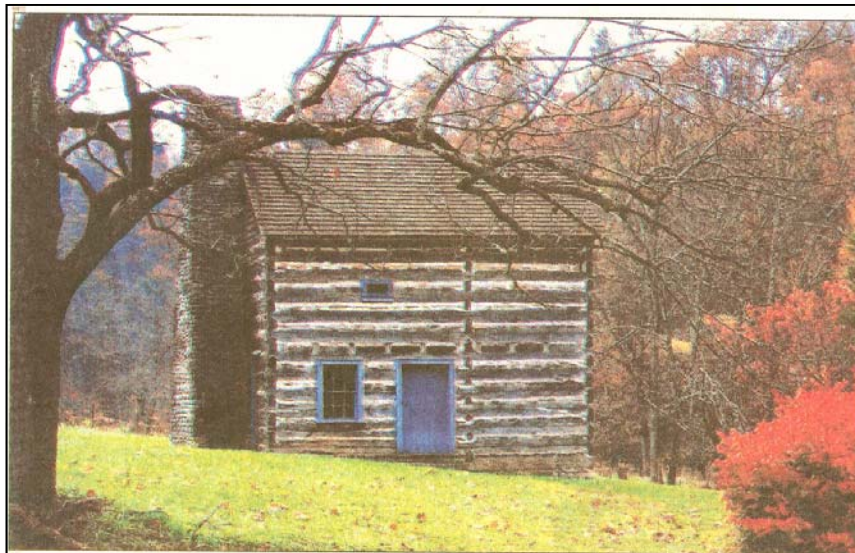

- vi. SARAH ELIZABETH FOGLEMAN, b. 13 Mar 1875; d. 23 Aug 1875.  
An inscription on the gravestone appears to read: "Sarah Elizabeth Infant Dau. of J.G. & S.A. Fogleman Mar. 13, 1875 Aug. 23, 1875 Age 5 Mos. 15 Da." She is buried at the Wares Grove Lutheran Church Cemetery, 69 Waresgrove Ln, Butler, Montgomery County, IL.
- vii. JULIANN DENTON FOGLEMAN, b. 26 Apr 1870; d. 23 Dec 1876.  
The inscription on the gravestone reads: "Juliann Denton Dau. of J.G. & S.A. Fogleman Apr. 26, 1870 Dec. 23, 1876 Age 6 Y's 7 Mo. 27 Da." "Not lost, blest thought, / But gone before / Where we shall meet / To part no more." Juliann died more than a year after her father and baby sister. It is possible that the cause of death was due to the cholera outbreak..." Juliann is buried at the Wares Grove Lutheran Church Cemetery, 69 Waresgrove Ln, Butler, Montgomery County, IL.

### ***Log house may resemble Plantation home***

The above photo appeared as 'My Best Shot' section in the *Orlando Sentinel*. "Nestled on the bank of Big Moccasin Creek in southwestern Virginia is the Kilgore Fort House, which was built during the late 1700s and served as a refuge for settlers traveling the Wilderness Road. Eddie Hammond of Titusville snapped this photo while on a visit to Gate City, Va., where he grew up."

This is the correct time period, and with Virginia being a neighboring state, it allows one to ponder if this is the type of home that George Fogleman built as the Plantation in Alamance County, North Carolina. The need for a second floor to sleep eight (8) children would certainly justify such a structure.
